





Teaser

Bratislava, one of the youngest capitals in Europe, actively promotes democratic resilience by translating democratic values into actionable public policies. As a facilitator for diverse societal issues, the city plays a crucial role in depolarizing and de-escalating pressing concerns. Through tangible actions, Bratislava reinforces trust and effectively integrates the principles of democracy into the daily lives of its citizens. The 'City for Children' project exemplifies this commitment.

Summary

Cities as safeguards of democracy Preserving democracy presents unique challenges in every country and region. While democracy has firmly taken root in Western Europe across generations, the fight for democratic values remains relevant and ongoing in Central and Eastern Europe (CEE). Alarming signal coming from the V4 region is the significant decline in public trust towards politicians, state and governmental institutions. The imperative to safeguard and nurture democracy in Slovakia has become increasingly urgent. The collapse of the Slovak government in December 2022, coupled with attempts by both domestic and foreign actors to undermine democracy through threats and misinformation, has resulted in alarmingly low levels of trust in the national government. According to Globsec Trends 2023, trust in the government hovers around a mere 18%. Despite declining trust levels, approximately 35.7% of respondents expressed trust in municipal institutions, according to a poll conducted by the akosamateslovensko.sk. Cities proved to be capable and trustworthy actors in tackling recent crises and vulnerabilities with dialogue and direct assistance to citizens. Combination of economic uncertainty, climate change risks and unprecedented violation of sovereignty on direct borders of the EU, threaten the stability of European democratic values. Based on recent experience and commitment to contribute to the mitigation of democratic threats, Bratislava aspires to become the European Capital of Democracy. In response to emerging undemocratic tendencies in the V4 region, Bratislava, along with other V4 Capitals, established the Pact of Free Cities alliance in 2019. This alliance aims to emphasize the crucial role of cities in maintaining democratic stability in the region. In challenging situations such as the COVID-19 pandemic, the war in Ukraine, and profound societal tragedies, including attacks against various communities, Bratislava demonstrates leadership and plays a crucial role in depolarizing and de-escalating tensions in society. In 2024, at the 35th Anniversary of the Velvet Revolution - an unprecedented political transition symbolizing the convergence of two nations towards democratic values - Bratislava aims to leverage this historical legacy and compelling narrative.

Summary

This message holds significant potential as a driving force to unite the CEE region under the umbrella of democracy. The focus on Public Space as a physical manifestation of democratic values is a concept that Bratislava aims to further develop. Over the past 35 years, public spaces in post-communist countries have undergone significant transformation. From being spaces that were once considered „everyone’s and no one’s,” where expressing opinions was unsafe, they have now evolved into open areas for the free expression of political views. Bratislava actively reshapes public spaces through inclusive methods, co-creating a shared democratic realm with its residents.

Democratic Ambitions

Drawing from recent experiences and a steadfast commitment to addressing democratic challenges, Bratislava aspires to become the next European Capital of Democracy. One of Bratislava’s primary democratic ambitions is to contribute to the mitigation of democratic threats by translating democratic values into public policies and ensuring accessibility to public spaces, whether physical or virtual, for the general public. The communist era left a significant investment shortfall in public spaces and buildings in Slovakia. The Bratislava city administration is committed to gradually revitalizing and upgrading these public spaces, with a focus on closer interconnection with inhabitants, fostering civic engagement, citizen participation, and the exercise of democratic values. This ambition is embodied by the current Mayor of Bratislava, Mr. Matúš Vallo, who is originally a respected and award-winning architect and civil society activist. His team places emphasis on well-designed public spaces, climate change mitigation and adaptation, accessible public transport, social welfare, and support for vulnerable groups. The city continues to strengthen its trust-based relationship with its inhabitants. Active and open communication enables the municipality to address urban development issues and significantly reduce administrative time. By implementing a bottom-up approach and embracing social and digital innovation, Bratislava aims to encourage more active participation and greater engagement from younger generations. The Project Ideas section describes some strategies and approaches that can enhance the engagement of citizens in participative governance. Drawing inspiration from larger cities and e-government implementation projects worldwide, Bratislava brings innovation based on open-source technologies, developing digital platforms for online citizen participation (demonstrated by the currently implemented project called Bratislava Account). Bratislava is committed to preparing and implementing stable institutional tools and frameworks for future citizens. The city aims to address the needs of children and caregivers in urban environments by focusing on neighbourhood planning and urban health. With a growing reputation in urban design and planning, the city seeks to prioritize these target groups and improve their well-being. Whether or not Bratislava succeeds in becoming the second European City of Democracy, the ambition is to utilize all pre-allocated financial resources accumulated through various grant schemes and open calls for pro-

jects to reinforce and empower democratic values. The City Foundation plays a crucial role in unifying all open calls under the umbrella message of democracy. Democracy, human rights, inclusion, sustainability, and citizen participation will become new subtitles for all grant schemes.

Achieved Successes

Bratislava leads as a democratic role model in Slovakia, supported by strategic documents and a municipal institutional framework for local governance. These initiatives demonstrate the city's commitment to embracing democratic values and fostering effective democratic practices: Bratislava 2030, a crucial document for local government management. It identifies challenges, defines goals, and establishes priorities for future development. This document provides a toolset that enables the local government to achieve its objectives. The strategy relies on the active participation of all municipal departments, organizations, and the city's expert capacities. It involves the general public, organized groups, and professionals through public meetings (Metropolitan Forums), surveys, workshops, and Working Group sessions. Bratislava 2030 also aligns with the Sustainable Development Goals outlined in the international document, the 2030 Agenda. It incorporates a robust monitoring system with measurable indicators linked to the objectives. The establishment of the Metropolitan Institute of Bratislava (MIB) marks a significant step in architecture, urban planning, participation, and strategic planning. MIB aims to promote quality architecture and functional solutions that address the evolving needs of Bratislava's inhabitants amidst social and environmental changes. Its flagship project, „The City for Children,“ prioritizes child-friendly planning and emphasizes the early adoption of participatory processes. Additionally, MIB plans to organize an international conference where city officials can discuss common issues, share experiences, and learn from experts. The first conference, scheduled for May 2024, aims to establish a respected annual platform for knowledge exchange. The Bratislava City Foundation plays a pivotal role in providing grants to support citizen initiatives. Established in 2020, the foundation operates under an innovative and transparent system that goes beyond supporting only civic associations and NGOs, extending its reach to individual community leaders as well. The Living Places programme represents a significant milestone in the deliberate revitalization of public spaces in the capital city. Led by the Metropolitan Institute of Bratislava, this initiative revitalizes public spaces and addresses the long-standing need for their modernization. The Assistance Centre on Bottova Street, established in April 2022 following Russia's military aggression against Ukraine, exemplifies the city's proactive role in crisis response and demonstrates the effectiveness of municipal structures, organizations, and citizen volunteers. Bratislava continually develops public policies in collaboration with experts and citizens, ensuring a functional participatory democracy. To address digitalization and citizen expectations, Bratislava has implemented measures to accelerate processes and meet evolving needs.



Future Challenges

As Bratislava looks to the future, it faces several key challenges in upholding its democratic values. **Political Destabilization:** The vulnerability of Slovak democracy in light of the upcoming parliamentary elections in September 2023, and the city's pivotal role in reinforcing citizen trust in public institutions, are acknowledged. Addressing these challenges requires promoting democratic literacy, media fact-checking, and fostering civil discourse. By strengthening democratic institutions and encouraging open discussions, we can mitigate destabilization and ensure the continuity of stable democratic processes. **Youth Engagement:** Youth engagement is paramount as their participation in political processes and civic activities is vital for an inclusive and vibrant democracy. To achieve this, initiatives such as youth councils, educational programs, and platforms amplifying their voices in policymaking are promoted. **The Role of the Democratic Public Space:** The democratic public space plays a significant role in addressing the vulnerability of democracies and mitigating political destabilization. In Slovakia, the fight for democracy remains relevant, and public spaces serve as crucial battlegrounds in this enduring struggle. This fight extends beyond national borders, as the importance of democracy resonates across Europe and the world. Public spaces and monuments serve as tangible reminders of the country's history and democratic milestones, such as the Velvet Revolution. They embody the collective memory and aspirations of the people, serving as gathering points for protests, celebrations, and democratic discourse. Recognizing the significance of public spaces, Bratislava takes proactive steps to revitalize and enhance these areas, fostering a sense of ownership among its citizens. The democratic public space facilitates dialogue, mediation, and conflict resolution between different societal groups or conflicting interests. It also serves as a safeguard for fundamental rights and liberties, providing a platform for the protection of freedom of speech, assembly, and association, allowing individuals and civil society organizations to defend democratic principles. **Transparency in Governance:** The role of the city in reinforcing citizen trust is crucial. Bratislava prioritizes open governance and provides accessible channels for public participation through the „Bratislava Account.“ Building bridges between the government and the people through engagement initiatives and feedback mechanisms fosters trust and accountability. By embracing these challenges, Bratislava can pave the way for a stronger, more resilient, and participatory democracy, setting an example for other cities. Through collective efforts and a commitment to democratic values, Bratislava can navigate the future and shape a brighter democratic path for its citizens.

Democratic Revival: Vivid Places of Bratislava

Brief description

Public spaces in the post-communist era were once considered anonymous and restricted. However, these neglected areas have long desired rejuvenation, providing residents with a welcoming and functional environment to foster community connections. To address the long-standing need for modernization, Bratislava introduces the „Vivid Places“ program, which marks a historic and systematic transformation of public spaces in the capital city. Implemented by the Metropolitan Institute of Bratislava since 2021, this initiative encompasses various projects aimed at reconstructing public spaces. The flagship project of the Vivid Places program is the Plateau Staromestská, symbolizing a transformative change. This pedestrian platform will reconnect the divided city center, creating a new public space. Through this program, Bratislava aims to revitalize its urban landscape and create vibrant, inclusive environments for its residents.

Detailed description

Bratislava recognizes the importance of actively reshaping public spaces through participatory and inclusive approaches. Vivid Places (Živé miesta), represents a significant milestone in the deliberate revitalization of public spaces in the capital city. Led by the Metropolitan Institute of Bratislava, this initiative aims to revitalize public spaces and address the long-standing need for their modernization. The Liberty Square The Liberty Square/Námestie Slobody stands as one of the most remarkable public space revitalization projects in Bratislava. After decades of neglect and underappreciation, the square has undergone a substantial reconstruction. The return of water to the „Družba“ fountain after 16 years has revitalized Liberty Square, infusing it with renewed energy and vibrancy. This restoration has had a profound impact on the democratic public space in Bratislava:

- the square has been reinvented by the citizens and transformed from a neglected and unsafe area into a vibrant and inclusive gathering place. The removal of the fountain pavement has made the fountain accessible, allowing people of all ages to play and enjoy the water.

- the restoration project was conducted with great sensitivity, ensuring the preservation of the square's unique character and historical significance.
- this revitalization has breathed new life into Liberty Square, making it a welcoming and dynamic public space for the community to enjoy.

The Plateau Staromestská The most ambitious project of the Vivid Places programme is the Plateau Staromestská, a pedestrian platform spanning approximately 218 meters in length and 20 meters in width. This platform will be constructed above Staromestská Street, a scar of communist urban planning that devastated the compactness of the city centre and resulted in the loss of a dominant synagogue in the 1970s. By creating this new area, the project aims to revitalize the city and restore a much-needed public space. Moreover, the plateau's design includes green roofing, fostering biodiversity and providing a habitat for songbirds and pollinators, addressing the population decline of these species. Additionally, the project will contribute to noise reduction in the area, utilizing turf and acoustic tiles to significantly decrease noise levels. The architectural study has recently been completed, and the project documentation is being prepared. Based on this documentation, a more detailed work schedule can be determined.

Contribution

The Vivid Places project makes a significant contribution to the overall mission of creating vibrant and inclusive public spaces in Bratislava. By revitalizing neglected areas and transforming them into welcoming and functional environments, the project enhances the quality of life for residents and fosters a sense of community connection.

What distinguishes this project is its emphasis on participatory and inclusive approaches, involving citizens in the decision-making process and co-creating the public spaces they desire. The innovative aspect lies in the use of creative design elements, sustainable practices, and the integration of technology to enhance the overall experience. This project aligns perfectly with the goals of the ECoD Programme Year, as it showcases Bratislava's commitment to democratic principles, citizen engagement, and the creation of dynamic and inclusive urban spaces.

Target Group

The target groups of the Vivid Places project are the citizens of Bratislava in general. After the transformation, the revitalized public spaces will provide the residents with a pleasant and functional environment for leisure activities and community gatherings. The project aims to benefit all members of the community by creating inclusive and accessible public spaces that enhance their quality of life.

These external partners, including diverse NGOs and representatives from the commercial sector, play crucial roles in different aspects of the project, ensuring a comprehensive and well-rounded approach to its implementation. Their collective contributions and collaboration strengthen the project's effectiveness and enhance its impact on the revitalization of public spaces in Bratislava.

One of the serious threats to democracy that we are facing is lack of understanding, and the tendency to isolate ourselves within their „information bubble.“ This threat has emerged due to the digital era, wherein people have access to personalized information and social media platforms that offer opinions in alignment with their existing attitudes. Bratislava City Days (BCD), a city-wide festival involving all municipal organizations can create a space to support participation, dialogue, collaboration, and cultural diversity. These aspects are crucial for strengthening democratic values and building a democratic culture in the city. It spans across districts, involving all city organizations, and brings the city to life over a captivating spring weekend. Celebrating its 20th anniversary in 2023, BCD has evolved to embrace inclusion, diversity, and sustainability. The festival’s programme is translated into English and Ukrainian, showcasing Bratislava’s commitment to inclusivity.

Detailed Description

The Days of Open Doors, deeply rooted in Bratislava’s legacy, hold a special place in the city’s modern history. Every year in late April, the city follows a tradition that dates back to the time of King Ondrej III, as outlined in the charter that bestowed the city with its esteemed privileges. Throughout various historical epochs, this event has played a pivotal role in the democratic process, culminating in the election of the city’s mayor. It is a cherished tradition that has endured for generations, serving as a testament to Bratislava’s rich cultural heritage. During this time of celebration, the city comes together to honour its past and embrace a hopeful future. Bratislava City Days, a city-wide festival, has established itself as a highly anticipated and cherished event on Bratislava’s cultural calendar. It serves as a vibrant showcase of the city’s spirit, embodying its values of openness and inclusivity. Spanning across all city districts and involving numerous city organizations, the festival boasts an impressive line-up of over 200 events, infusing the city with energy and excitement during a captivating spring weekend in April. In 2023, Bratislava City Days celebrates its 20th anniversary, marking two decades of cultural celebration and community engagement.

Bratislava City Days stands as a testament to the city's vibrant cultural scene, its unwavering dedication to inclusivity, and its celebration of diversity. It unites people, fosters a sense of community, and showcases Bratislava as a welcoming city for all.

Contribution

Inspired by the belief that art and culture provide insightful observations of past and present social processes, the Bratislava City Days festival serves as a powerful testament to the profound impact of culture on democratic values. Without the constraints of geography or language, artists possess a unique ability to keenly perceive and reflect upon the current state of affairs and the collective aspirations of society. The Art of Democracy, an integral part of the annual programs of the European Capitals of Democracy (ECoD), celebrates the intersection of contemporary fine art, participation, and society. In line with this idea, each edition of the Bratislava City Days festival presents an array of street shows, theatre performances, concerts, workshops, and captivating walk-in art installations. These dynamic elements create a space where art and society intertwine, fostering engagement, dialogue, and a deeper connection between artists and the community.

Communication

One of the most exciting aspects of BCD communication is the chance to visit unique places and see exhibits that are not usually open to the public. Special website www.bratislavskemestskedni.sk provides information in Slovak, Ukrainian, and English. The program is communicated through social media channels highlighting the city and the involvement of its institutions. Media communication includes online and offline channels, as well as a special program bulletin (online/print). The organizers also collect feedback from the audience through online and offline surveys to directly track satisfaction levels. One of the main findings is that the vast majority of BCD visitors (86%) rated the program as excellent or very good, and they attended the event with their families and children, with the children's program being particularly attractive. The most effective communication channels for reaching the audience are the social media channels of the City and the Organizer, BKIS.

Project Setup

The project setup involved city employees and staff from public institutions. Remarkably, the program included the extraordinary opportunity to visit the mayor in his office. The mayor himself served as a guide for selected guided walks.



Assistance Centre of Help on Bottova Street Large-capacity Centre for Ukrainian Refugees

Brief Description

In April 2022, Bratislava took prompt action in responding to the Ukrainian crisis by establishing a new, large-capacity assistance centre at Bottova Street's temporary bus station. This initiative demonstrates the city's commitment to addressing refugee needs and showcases immediate and effective collaboration between municipal structures, the state, international organizations, NGOs, volunteers, and the private sector. The centre included 25 Immigration Police offices, providing temporary refuge status and crucial services such as legal advice, psycho-social and health assistance, and regular medical treatment. Involvement of international organizations like The Red Cross, UNHCR, and UNICEF further enhance the project's impact. Operating 24/7, the centre offered primary support up to 2,500 individuals per day, establishing a sustainable foundation for long-term, high-quality assistance to Ukrainians in need.

Detailed Description

The Bottova Assistance Centre for Refugees and Displaced Persons from Ukraine serves as a crucial support hub for individuals in need. Its activities were formally initiated by the "Order to carry out rescue operations" by the Office of the District Chief on 24th March 2022, with its official opening taking place within unprecedented amount of time – in a couple of days. The centre provides a range of assistance services, including support from the Foreign Police, the Migration Office, accommodation mediation through the District Office, psychological, social, and legal counselling, as well as medical services and financial aid registration until recently. Additionally, the centre offers integration and community activities such as language courses, community initiatives for various age groups, and employment counselling. This initiative not only demonstrates the city's dedication to meeting the requirements of Ukrainian refugees but also showcases the successful cooperation among municipal structures, the state, international organizations, NGOs, citizen volunteers, and the private sector, emphasizing a bottom-up approach. International organizations as The Red Cross, UNHCR and UNICEF are also involved in the project, further enhancing its scope and impact. The Assistance Centre was designed to offer primary support up to up to 2,500 individuals per day, operating 24/7, particularly during the initial stages of the conflict.

Detailed Description

This initiative established a systematic and sustainable foundation in Bratislava for delivering high-quality services to Ukrainians in need over the long term. Here are some facts and figures demonstrating the impact of the project:

- Maximum daily capacity of the center: 2,500 individuals.
- Peak numbers reached: 1,193 people in March 2022 and 910 people in September 2022.
- Total number of assistance services provided since the opening: 136,500.
- Temporary shelters issued in Bratislava: 31,000 (compared to 100,000 nationwide).
- Registered individuals availing services from January 1, 2023, to April 12, 2023: 25,229.
- Average daily registration: 360 individuals, including approximately 70 newcomers requesting temporary shelter.
- Additional activities and services participation: Average daily participation of 200 individuals.
- Monthly costs (excluding personnel expenses): Approximately 85,000 EUR covering operational costs, refreshments, rescue services, warehouse management, and registration.
- Financial coverage for counselling services, community activities, language courses, and mobile field team: Provided by international organizations such as UNICEF and UNHCR through bilateral partnership agreements and their own resources.
- Other expenses (personnel costs, volunteer management, production, and equipment): Covered by a large portfolio of private donors

The future of the Project: The Assistance Centre is undergoing a transformation into a Contact Point in 2024, catering to individuals of foreign origin residing or planning to reside in Bratislava. The revised primary objective of the centre is to act as a central hub for information and services.

Information providers will be responsible for supplying comprehensive details concerning local service arrangements, healthcare, and school enrolment for children. Planned services and activities, whether provided internally or externally, encompass legal counselling, psychosocial counselling, career counselling, language courses, socio-cultural orientation courses, community interpreters, mobile field team, educational activities, and initiatives fostering intercultural dialogue. All assistance services will be supervised by the state.

Contribution

The Assistance Centre on Bottova Street contributes to the Mission Statement values by promoting inclusivity, non-discrimination, and access to justice.

Climathon Bratislava: Addressing Climate Change Through Innovative Smart Solutions

Brief Description

The Climathon Bratislava project makes a significant contribution to addressing the pressing threats posed by climate change. By bringing together a diverse range of stakeholders, including the city, experts, private partners, and individuals, it fosters collaborative problem-solving and generates innovative solutions to mitigate the impacts of climate change. The goal this 48-hour intense event is to design and validate proof of concept solutions tackling challenges prepared by the city and then test them out. Some of the ideas were transformed into city's Mobility as a Service app. Climathon Bratislava is a part of a global Climathon movement. It brings together experienced mentors, practice experts, business leaders, as well as climate change enthusiasts from all over Slovakia and abroad to address climate change in the region. Climathon worldwide initiative is powered by EIT Climate KIC implementing innovative green solutions across the globe.

Detailed Description

The City of Bratislava envisions itself as a resilient and sustainable city, committed to creating a livable urban space for its citizens. Through its participation in the Climathon, the city is actively addressing the efficient functioning of its infrastructure and developing services that enhance its climate resilience. Climathon Bratislava is an event organized by the city and the Department of Innovations and Digital Services of Bratislava. It is part of a global movement that includes over 140 cities from 56 countries worldwide. The event brings together experienced mentors, practice experts, technical and business leaders, and climate change enthusiasts from all over Slovakia. Its aim is to address climate change in the Central European region. This 48-hour hackathon-style event is centred around collaborative work aimed at developing ideas, projects, and initiatives that contribute to climate change mitigation and adaptation. In Climathon 2022, a total of 200 individuals actively participated, forming 29 teams. The teams dedicated a full 48 hours to their work within the modern premises of the coworking space located in Bratislava downtown. By the end of the weekend, they had prepared 23 innovative solutions. An exciting aspect of the event was the exclusive access granted to Climathon participants to live data from a premiere software engineering company.

Detailed Description

This access allowed them to incorporate relevant and up-to-date information into their solutions, further enhancing their quality and applicability. Among the winning projects from the latest Climathon are solutions to the following problems:

- Optimization and improvement of the city's response time in the case of extreme weather issues such as rainstorms or floods.
- Optimization of road maintenance by identifying the most critical infrastructure.
- Effectiveness enhancement of public transport by evaluating the most frequent routes.
- The Climathon initiative is a global movement powered by EIT Climate KIC, implementing innovative green solutions across the globe.

Besides organizing the Climathon event series since 2020, the Department of Innovation and Digital Services of Bratislava co-designs digital services for residents, aiming to reinforce the digital literacy of the population and offer easy, simple and fast digital services. An example of this commitment to digitalization and e-government principles is the digital portal called „Bratislavské konto“ (Bratislava ID), which provides various digital services, including property tax payment. The service is accessible to all residents of Bratislava, where 24 000 of them used the service in 2023 and 90% were very satisfied with the service. Another task of the department is to digitally transform and modernise the city and its organisations, such as the Bratislava City Gallery, the City Library, City Funeral Home and the Bratislava City Foundation. The Department of Innovation also manages a unique platform called The City Laboratory, which serves as a testing ground for innovative solutions. This platform allows for the trial and verification of smart and innovative projects, often conducted in collaboration with external partners from the private, academic, and public sectors. These solutions are tested before they are procured, which saves public finances and targets efforts to relevant problems. The suggested dates for 2024 are tentative and subject to possible change.

Contribution

As stated in the Mission Statement Summary, Bratislava prioritizes democratic values, human rights, inclusion, sustainability, and citizen participation. These key principles are not only emphasized in strategic documents but also reflected in all grant schemes. Bratislava takes concrete actions to mitigate climate risks through urban development, the greener redesign of public spaces, child-friendly planning, and the digitalization of city services. Climathon is committed to bringing innovative and smart solutions to mitigate climate risks.

Throughout the year, the team works together to shape the challenges proposed by the city, prepare the communication campaign, program, and side events for Climathon. They also follow up on the pilots with the winning teams, ensuring a comprehensive and coordinated effort.

Bratislava City Foundation Support of Cultural and Community Life

Brief Description

The Bratislava City Foundation plays a pivotal role in providing grants to support citizen initiatives. Established in 2020, the foundation operates under an innovative and transparent system that goes beyond supporting only civic associations and NGOs, extending its reach to individual community leaders as well. This pioneering approach, based on Slovak legislation, represents a legal innovation that serves as an inspiration for other cities. Operating under the „arm’s length“ principle, independent specialists evaluate the quality of projects. The foundation focuses on culture, community life, and overall development in Bratislava. To address pressing issues, the foundation launched a one-time Special Call for Proposals in 2022 specifically aimed at assisting refugees in Bratislava. By providing support and resources, the Bratislava City Foundation actively contributes to fostering inclusivity, integration, and social cohesion within the city.

Detailed Description

The Bratislava City Foundation, established in 2020, is a transparent and modern grant system that supports the city in implementing public policies. Operating on the „arm’s length“ principle, it relies on independent specialists to evaluate project quality. With a focus on cultural sustainability, community life, and overall development, the foundation has invested over 2M € in cultural and community projects. It has taken over the role of supporting cultural initiatives previously handled by the „Ars Bratislavensis“ grant program, which ended on January 1, 2019. Compared to the previous program, the Bratislava City Foundation offers several advantages:

- Increased budget: The grant program now has a higher budget allocation, allowing for more substantial support to cultural and community projects.
- Streamlined approval process: The foundation has implemented a more efficient and streamlined application approval process.
- Additionally, they have introduced an electronic system for submitting grant applications, making the process more convenient and accessible.

Detailed Description

- Support for informal community initiatives and individuals: The foundation recognizes the importance of supporting not only formal organizations but also informal community initiatives and individual artists.
- The artistic scholarship program supports individuals, including professional artists, critics, theorists, and other experts working in the field of creative works, and research across all forms of arts and culture in Bratislava.

To date, the Bratislava City Foundation has attributed €2,157,202 to cultural and community projects in various neighbourhoods. They have received a total of 1,907 proposal applications and have supported 728 projects based on the specified criteria in each proposal. The resources of the Bratislava City Foundation are allocated through four different grant program schemes, ensuring comprehensive support for a range of cultural and community initiatives. Grant scheme Community Grant scheme Culture Scholarship programme Arts Special Grant call for projects supporting cooperation and intercultural dialogue Special funds addressing vulnerable communities: Ukrainian Refugees The one-time Special Call for Proposals addressed the pressing issue of refugees in the city, providing support for diverse cultural and community activities. It focused on engaging people from Ukraine, promoting cooperation, intercultural dialogue, and meeting the needs of incoming communities, amidst the critical situation in the region. The funds, totalling €100,000 annually, aimed to strengthen the capacities of organizations committed to working with foreign citizens. Eligible applicants included NGOs engaged in long-term work with foreign citizens, as well as organizations in culture, art, and communities, or the private sector. LGBTI+ Bratislava faces the challenge of addressing the increasing incidents of hate speech targeting the LGBTI+ community. In response, the City Foundation plays a crucial role in promoting inclusivity and advocating for equal rights. Through its grant programs, the Foundation supports a wide range of inclusive community initiatives. Additionally, NGOs focusing on LGBTI+ agenda are also successful in call proposals offering grants for strategic cultural events. Notable examples of that are events like „DramaQueer,“ The Bratislava Rainbow Pride,“ and the „Rainbow Families“ initiative. Furthermore, The Old City district of Bratislava took a proactive step by offering a non-commercial rental space for the establishment of a Community Centre by the NGO „Inakosť“. Recognizing the importance of revitalizing this space, Bratislava City showed its dedication by approving a special one-off grant from the city budget in upcoming year.

Contribution

The Bratislava City Foundation plays a key role in promoting citizen participation and co-creation of public spaces, culture, and education in the city. It focuses on specific topics outlined in the eligibility criteria for project funding.

Brief Description

This initiative challenges the norm that excludes school children from decision-making. By actively involving them in matters that affect their well-being, such as safety and access to public spaces, children are empowered to express their needs and opinions. This helps them recognize the value of their opinions and highlights the importance of decision-makers considering their perspectives. „Play Streets“ has been a remarkable outcome, transforming car-centric spaces into inclusive, safe, and democratic public areas. In addition, the initiative seeks to establish an international conference where city officials from around the world can exchange ideas, tackle shared challenges, and learn from experts, practitioners, and researchers.

Detailed Description

Overall, a child-friendly urban planning agenda enhances democracy by promoting inclusivity, civic engagement, social equity, sustainability, and interdisciplinary collaboration. It empowers children as active participants in shaping their communities and lays the foundation for a more democratic and inclusive society. „The City for Children“ initiative is a groundbreaking collaboration that prioritizes the well-being of children and caregivers in urban planning. This visionary project, implemented by The Metropolitan Institute of Bratislava (MIB), brings together diverse stakeholders to create a child-friendly environment where participation is key. Typically excluded from decision-making processes, school children in Bratislava now have the opportunity to actively participate in shaping their surroundings through the „City for Children“ project. They learn about democratic processes, initiate change, and engage in community participation. Building relationships with public administration, the city, and their peers, the project fosters cohesion around shared themes such as child safety and space accessibility.

Play Streets – The Neighbourhood Festivals :

The implementation of „Play Streets“ has led to a remarkable transformation of car-centric spaces into inclusive, safe, and democratic public areas. The concept encourages active modes of transportation like walking and cycling while reducing vehicular traffic. By repurposing these areas for recreational activities, communities have witnessed positive impacts such as strengthened social connections, increased physical activity, and an overall improved quality of life.

The International Conference on Child-friendly Urban Plannin:

Additionally, the initiative aims to establish a leading international conference where city officials worldwide can discuss common challenges, share experiences, and learn from practitioners, researchers, consultants, and academics. The first year of the conference is already in the preparatory phase, with the organizational team set up and budgeting underway. The conference, planned for May 2024, aims to establish itself as a respected annual event platform for knowledge exchange in the field. The conference, titled „Building the Child-Friendly Urban Present,“ will leverage Bratislava’s growing reputation in urban design and planning for children and caregivers. It will bring together influential individuals and institutions in the fields of urban childhood health and innovative governance. The conference will facilitate regional coordination efforts in areas such as decarbonization, democracy-building, and urban health through collaborations with bodies like the Pact of Free Cities. By positioning neighbourhood planning and urban health as key strategic pillars, the conference aims to counter the destabilizing effects of climate change on politics. The convention will cover a wide range of topics, including:

- Neighborhood planning and proximity: promoting walking and biking to access services
- Mobility Justice: creating safe spaces and going beyond infrastructure
- Gender-inclusive spaces and building cities that prioritize care
- Local-level measures to protect children and caregivers from air pollution
- The role of play, childhood independence, and local democracy
- Exploring the connection between play, tradition, and design culture
- Global examples of child-friendly planning agendas led by children
- Scaling grassroots neighborhood initiatives and ensuring their long-term sustainability
- Early childhood development and the role of caregiving in the public realm
- Innovations in governance, including the establishment of positions like the Chief Heat Officer to address new challenges
- Success stories in countering disinformation
- Innovative approaches to financing pilot projects and reducing risk in cities’ experimentation efforts.

Volunteers: The project team also works with caregivers and teachers within school communities who are concerned about the functionality of the school surroundings and the broader context of participatory processes in Bratislava.

Participation of the Civil Society

The initiative partners with diverse non-profit organizations that support the instruction and learning of youngsters. Furthermore, we involve vulnerable Ukrainian communities through the City for Children program, prioritizing the well-being of children in their transitional residences. The interaction between Slovak and Ukrainian youth plays a crucial part in fostering integration, promoting understanding, and challenging preconceptions, including among parents.



DEMOCRACY DIMENSION: PARTICIPATION

Empowering Bratislava's Youth Revitalizing the Bratislava Youth Parliament

Challenge

Bratislava faces several challenges in promoting youth engagement and democratic participation, including the current absence of an active Youth Parliament in the city. The legislative amendments necessary for the establishment of a Youth Parliament are pending, with the hopeful timeline of implementation in September 2023. The declining interest and trust in civic engagement among the youth pose a significant pain point, despite relatively higher trust in communal institutions. Moreover, the democratic trends in Slovakia require concerted efforts to foster active citizenship among the youth. However, the presence of the European Democracy Youth Network (EDYN) headquarters in Bratislava provides a positive opportunity for collaboration and support. The objective of the project is to (re-)establish and empower the Bratislava Youth Parliament, providing a platform for young citizens to actively participate in decision-making processes and contribute to the development of their communities. The Youth Parliament will serve as a representative body, advocating for the interests and concerns of young people, and bridging the gap between youth and local governance.

Solution

Bratislava Youth Parliament provides a dedicated forum for young citizens to actively engage in decision-making processes and shape the future of their communities. It offers a direct channel for youth voices to be heard, represented, and influential in local governance. For those who desire to be actively involved but are not organized within a youth parliamentary structure, the YOUTH HUB is being created as part of the Bratislava Youth Parliament initiative. It aims to provide a physical space where young people can participate in discussions, education, and various forms of active engagement. The YOUTH HUB will also offer support services through voluntary assistance and the expertise of psychology and pedagogy students, acting as an initial point of contact

Solution

for youth. Volunteering is another valuable way to establish a trustworthy relationship with the city. The project „Zapni sa pre Slovensko / Turn on for Slovakia“ offers a volunteering platform where citizens can participate in a wide range of activities and collaborate with their municipalities. By engaging in these projects, citizens contribute to community improvement while building trust with the city. The platform, created by an external provider, serves as a centralized hub for institutions to submit their volunteering projects. The overarching tagline of the project emphasizes the rewarding nature of active civic engagement: „We reward those who have turned themselves on.“

Impact

The Bratislava Youth Parliament aims to provide the next generations with a toolkit and skills for participative and collaborative governance. It aims to empower young citizens by offering them a platform where they can actively engage in decision-making processes and contribute to shaping the future of their communities. Citizens become part of the project when they realize that their voices matter and that they have the ability to make a meaningful impact on the issues that concern them. Volunteering plays a crucial role in this involving process, as it allows citizens to gain a deeper understanding of the democratic process and actively engage in decision-making. The lack of interest or apathy among young citizens can often be attributed to a lack of experience and trust in their ability to influence change. The Bratislava Youth Parliament addresses this by providing a structured platform that educates and empowers young people to actively participate in decision-making processes. By demonstrating the impact, they can have on local governance, the project aims to break down barriers and build trust, showing young citizens that their opinions and contributions are valued and can make a difference in their communities.

Execution

The project will engage young citizens through schools and universities collaborating with their student parliaments or representative bodies. Through strategic partnerships with youth organizations and NGOs, the project maximizes its outreach to young citizens. Notably, the Bratislava Youth Parliament acknowledges the value of collaborating with esteemed organizations such as EDYN. This collaboration amplifies the project's influence and expands its reach to international levels.

Execution

In addition, the project explores the adoption of a rewarding system for volunteers. Taking inspiration from some employers in Slovakia, the city administration may consider recognizing and rewarding citizens who actively participate in volunteering activities. This approach can incentivize more individuals to engage in the project, further strengthening the bond between citizens and municipal bodies. The project will explore alternative funding sources, including grants and partnerships with businesses and philanthropic organizations. The immediate achievement is the establishment of an engaged Bratislava Youth Parliament, providing a platform for young individuals to shape policies and foster active citizenship. 
